#	Question:	State Response:
1	If this RFI greenlights a solicitation, what is the estimated timeframe for procurement?	The anticipated release date of the RFP is summer 2024.
2	What is the anticipated contract value?	The total projected budgeted amount for Direct Services is \$759,800 in SFY25 with the potential for a program expansion to ~\$2.9M in SFY26. The State cannot determine a contract value because the number of providers is undetermined.
3	Is the State looking for TA providers who do not provide direct services?	Not at this time.
4	The Global Commitment to Health Section 1115 Demonstration waiver includes the expenditure limits, is that inclusive of the cost of the conflict-free case management system?	Costs for case management are not included.
5	Will the state please provide the budget for the case management system?	The state does not have this information to provide at this time.
6	In the interest of giving providers adequate time to provide a robust response, would the state consider extending the due date to April 12?	No, the timeline for implementing the benefit does not accommodate extending the RFI deadline. The RFI is not a competitive process. Additionally, agencies are not required to respond to RFI in order to respond to the RFP.
7	How do you anticipate that this program might impact or complement existing PSH programs listed in section 4, such as SASH and Shelter+Care?	The new program is intended to complement all existing programs listed in section 4 of the RFI.
8	Are there plans, or might there be in the future, to coordinate with the Department of Housing and Community Development to develop PSH residences with on-site supports?	Housing partners have been and continue to be engaged in planning.
9	What are potential funding sources?	The funding source for the benefit is Medicaid
10	Do you have a sense of how PSH and a housing first model might be received by the various housing agencies across Vermont?	The state agrees with the housing agencies across the state seem generally positive about expanding PSH.
